### Disney pins big hopes on 'Lion King'

LOS ANGELES — Some acts are sourly impossible to follow, and the Walt Disney Co.'s predicament is not that: How can Daney possibly op 1992's record-breaking Aladdin? The stadio prays the answer is The Lion King, Daney's first completely regional animated film.

With EuroDiancy hemorrhaging millions in losses a week and most of the company's current films (Anpa, Blank Check, The Refi playing a nearly empty houses, the presnare on The Lian King grows even more performed.

Judging from an early glimpue of Liso King footage. Disney seems to save somehow palled it off. use 24. Aladdin is the highest-grossing animated faim of all time, with domestic box-office receipts in excess of \$217 million. But the U.S. movies tacket sales tell only a fraction of the film's financial sitery.

Counting home-wideo sales of 24 million units (\$5 profit per cantette), an array of consumer products, international move sales, and a popolar soundtrack album, Aladda accounted for a whopping 27 percent of Damey's total 1993 operating profits, according to a recent study by NatWest Socurities.

Although that percentage may be slightly high, the importance of Disney's animated filters cannot be overstated. "It really is hage." NatWest analyst Paul Marsh says of the expectations for The Loon King, Dumey's 32nd ammated beature.

"Every new film, they seem to get better and better at promoting it." Marsh says. "Hopefully, they will keep the ball rolling."

Disney plans to release three animated movies every two years (Pocationize in due next year) and has started producing direct-to-video animated movies (Return of Jalar, due May 20).

"It's tough to follow movies like Beauty and the Beaut and Aladin," says Don Halm, the producer of The Low Rung as he feverably tries to funsh the film.

"And yet, at the end of the day, you can forget about that and just say, 'OK. How can we create some thing that's fresh and different and new?" If we kept remaking the same film again and again, we would lose our creative edge."

The movie tells the story of a young into cub destined to rale the langdom who flees when his evil uncle tracks him mito believing that he caused his father's death. Unlike Aladdin, Beauty and the Beaut and The Lettle Mermand, there are no human characters in the film.

While not adapted from one specific book or story. The Lon Kog esstrongly remeasered of Hamiet, the Old Testament, Greek tragedy and classic hero mythology. If the thesis of Besuty and the Beast is don't judge a book by its cover, The Lon King lefts about that moment when children become adults.

"I think that's why it's such a familiar story to people, even though it's an original story." says llaten, who also produced Boauty and the Boast and was the associate producer on Who Framed Roger Rabbe.


