










## **Safety Around Strangers**








"Well, not all strangers are bad, Pablo. Most people are nice. But you do have to watch out for strangers acting strangely.

## Quantifiers – Much, Many, A Lot

#### much + uncountables nounns

- much money
- much time
- much food
- much coffee

#### many + plural nouns

- many books
- many people
- many shops
- many questions

a lot (of)
is more usual in
positive sentences.

Much or Many?
pens
lemonade
peaches
sugar
children
rice

Positive: I have a lot of crayons.

Negative: I don't have many crayons.

## SOME/ANY

We use some and any like this:

- a. For a question, we use 'any'
- b. For a positive answer, we use 'some'
- c. For a negative answer, we use 'any'

#### Do you have any money?

- Yes, I have some money.
- No, I don't have any money.

#### Do you play any sports?

- Yes, I play some sports.
- No, I don't play any sports.

#### Are there **any** students in the classroom?

- Yes, there are some students in the classroom
- No, there aren't **any** students in the classroom.



#### Parts of a Letter

#### Heading

The heading can include your address and the date, but you can just put the date. The heading is in the upper right hand corner of your letter.

#### **Greeting**

The greeting is your way of saying "hello." Since this is a letter to Santa, you can simply write, "Dear Santa," Don't forget your comma after your greeting.

#### Body

The body is where you write your message and include your wish for others. Be sure to explain why you want this wish to come true.


#### closing

The closing is your way of saying "goodbye."
You could use:

Sincerely, Happy Holidays, Your friend, Best wishes, Merry Christmas, Yours truly,

#### signature


This is where you sign your name!


